DUAL ENROLLMENT PROGRAM



WHAT IS DUAL ENROLLMENT (DE)?

The dual enrollment program enables qualified public, private and homeschool students an opportunity to participate in an academic acceleration program. Dual enrollment allows students to pursue an advanced curriculum that earns them both high school and college credit, simultaneously.

BENEFITS OF DUAL ENROLLMENT:

- > Get a head start on earning college credit
- > Gain access to college resources and campus life
- > Gain life-long learning skills
- > Explore interesting subjects through a variety of course offerings
- Engage with different instructional methods available: classroom, online, mixed mode or real-time virtual
- > Experience the college atmosphere
- > Offset the cost of a college education
- > Stand out among your peers

DUAL ENROLLMENT 101

VALENCIA COLLEGE STUDENT ID CARD:

You will need a Valencia College ID card to access the campus library, for testing purposes, to receive discounts in the community and for other benefits. Once you are registered for classes, you can request a Valencia College ID card for free by visiting your Campus Security Office with a valid ID (example: driver's license or school ID) and a physical copy of your Student Detail Schedule (can be found in Atlas).

TRANSPORTATION:

As a student at Valencia College, you will be able to ride the LYNX system absolutely free. Bring your Valencia College ID to your Campus Security Office to pick up an official LYNX sticker validation. To ride for free, show your Valencia College ID with the LYNX sticker validation upon boarding the bus.

PARKING:

Vehicles parked on Valencia College premises without a parking permit are at risk of being towed or being issued a parking violation. To avoid this, request your student parking decal free of cost.

Steps to request parking decal:

- 1. Log into your Atlas account
- 2. Select the Courses tab

COLLEGE DICTIONARY

- > Academic Year: Year that begins with the fall term (August to December), extends through spring term (January to April) and ends with the summer term (May to August).
- Academic Calendar: Important dates and deadlines specific to each semester including, but not limited to, drop deadline, withdrawal deadline and graduation application deadline, valenciacollege,edu/calendar
- > Course Load: Number of credits a student takes in a term.
- > FLEX courses: Accelerated courses that are shorter than the full-term semester.

 Dual enrollment students are not eligible for FLEX courses (H1, H2, TWK, TWJ)

 during fall and spring.
- **> Drop Course:** Procedure a student uses at specific times to remove a course from his/her class schedule without penalty.
- Withdrawal 'W': Removing a course from your student schedule after the drop/ refund deadline. Dual enrollment students are allowed a maximum of one withdrawal. If a student obtains more than one withdrawal, they become ineligible for the dual enrollment program.
- > Academic Warning: A student's academic standing after earning a term grade point average (GPA) of less than 2.0 at Valencia College.
- Academic Probation: Two consecutive terms of academic warning. Once a student is placed on academic probation, they are no longer eligible for the dual enrollment program.
- > Grade Forgiveness: Refers to one grade in a course replacing another grade in the same course when certain conditions are met. A student can retake a course for grade forgiveness, when an original grade of a D, F or W is obtained in a course. There is a maximum of one grade forgiveness retake per course as a dual enrollment student.
- Degree Audit: An electronic tool to help you plan your academic goals and work toward completing AA graduation requirements. (Atlas account > Courses Tab > Registration column > My Degree > Check My Degree Audit)
- > Mixed-mode courses: Mixed-mode courses where students do not meet for face-to-face class every week. The professor determines the frequency of the face-to-face class meetings and the the rest of the course load is completed online.
- Real-time Virtual courses: Class meetings are virtual at specific days and times to interact live with faculty and students in a virtual environment. Assignments are completed online outside of the class session.



WHICH COURSES SHOULD I TAKE?

The purpose of dual enrollment is to prioritize meeting high school requirements while simultaneously gaining college credits. According to the Florida Department of Education, the requirements for a high school diploma are:

- > 4 English credits
- > 4 Math credits
- > 3 Science credits
- > 3 Social Science credits

Must be:

- 1 World History credit
- 1 U.S. History credit
- 0.5 U.S. Government credit
- · 0.5 Economics credit
- > 1 Physical Education credit
- > 8 Flective credits
- > 1 Fine Art, Speech or Practical Art credit
- > 2 World Language credits (in the same language)

 Not required for high school, but highly encouraged since it is required for the A.A. degree at Valencia College
- > 1 Online course

HOW CAN I FIND OUT WHICH COLLEGE COURSES CAN TRANSFER BACK TO MY HIGH SCHOOL?

- Step 1: Meet with your high school dual enrollment representative to discuss your high school requirements.
- Step 2: Schedule an advising appointment with your Valencia College dual enrollment coordinator at **valenciacollege.edu/dual-advising**

CAN I REGISTER FOR ANY COLLEGE COURSE OFFERED BY VALENCIA COLLEGE?

- > Dual enrollment students cannot register for FLEX courses in the fall and spring, physical education courses or courses that are less than three credit hours.

WHAT IS THE MAXIMUM NUMBER OF CREDITS THAT I CAN REGISTER FOR?

You may register for a maximum of 13 credits at Valencia College (four courses) for each of the spring and fall semesters. You may register for a maximum of 7 credits at Valencia College (two courses) during the summer semester. If you are a full-time student—enrolled in four courses at Valencia College—then you are not required to take any courses in high school, but can enroll in up to two high school courses.

WHAT DO I HAVE TO DO TO MAINTAIN MY DUAL ENROLLMENT STUDENT STATUS?

The dual enrollment program requires you to maintain a minimum 3.0 high school CGPA and a minimum 2.0 Valencia College GPA per semester, with a maximum of one withdrawal. Communication with your Valencia College DE coordinator and high school DE representative is highly encouraged since it will help you to stay on track. All dual enrollment students are required to follow the policies listed on the Underage Agreement and/or Homeschool Articulation Agreement (if applicable).

HOW DO I KNOW WHAT TOPICS ARE COVERED IN A COURSE OR IF IT HAS PREREQUISITES?

Accessing **valenciacollege.edu/courses** allows you to view the course descriptions and any prerequisites (if applicable).

ADVANCED PLACEMENT (AP) EXAMS:

It is your responsibility to submit AP exam scores in the appropriate time needed for Valencia College to receive and process the scores. Processing time is approximately five weeks. To send AP exam scores to Valencia College, log into your College Board account and request that scores be sent to Valencia College. ASSOCIATE IN ARTS DEGREE

If you're planning on getting a bachelor's degree, then the Associate in Arts (A.A.) degree is for you. It's equivalent to the first two years at a state university. Once you've earned your A.A. at Valencia College, you may choose to stay here to earn your bachelor's degree. You can also transfer to a four-year university as a junior, including the University of Central Florida, which guarantees* admission through **DirectConnect to UCF***. (If you simultaneously graduate with your A.A. and your high school diploma, you are not eligible for DirectConnect as you are considered a freshman upon transfer to UCF.) However, all Valencia College graduates are guaranteed admission into one of Florida's 12 state universities as a junior (but not necessarily to the school or program of their choice), consistent with university policy.

College credits earned as a dual enrollment student will apply toward your A.A. degree, with two years of the same foreign language completed in high school satisfying the Valencia College foreign language requirement.

COURSEWORK

The General Studies A.A. provides a basic liberal arts education, with courses focused in five key areas: communications, humanities, mathematics, science and social science. It also includes plenty of elective courses (courses you choose) so that you can focus your studies toward a specific major or simply explore subjects that interest you.

DEGREE PATHWAYS

If you already have an intended university major, you can start preparing for it by following a Degree Pathway. It will serve as a guide for which courses to take in order start fulfilling the prerequisites that you'll need.

COLLEGE LEVEL EXAMINATION PROGRAM (CLEP):

CLEP is a series of standardized tests that helps you receive college credit for what you already know, for a fraction of the cost of a college course. CLEP exams are available for a wide range of subjects. The CLEP is offered at Valencia College and costs \$109 per test. CLEP exams with a score of 50 or higher receive credit for a college course. ADVANCED ALGEBRA AND FUNCTIONS (AAF):

The AAF is used to determine if you are eligible for a higher-level math, such as trigonometry, calculus, pre-calculus, statistics, etc. You may take the AAF in order to place into a higher math course. Please note that you will not receive credit for the lower-level course(s) that you do not take. The AAF is offered through Valencia College and is free of cost the first time taking the test. There is a \$10 retake fee per test. For more information about the AAF, visit:

 - Must complete a minimum of 6 credit hours of math course work. 3 credit hours must come from the Math Core section.

- Science (6 credits)
 - Must complete a minimum of 6 credit hours of science course work. 3 credit hours must come from the Science Core section.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

To be considered for admission to the Seneff Honors College, applicants with 6 or more college credits must have a minimum cumulative GPA of 3.0 or higher and submit all required application materials. High school students with less than 6 college credits, including Dual Enrolled, must have a minimum unweighted high school GPA of 3.0 or higher. LEARNING SUPPORT CENTERS AND TUTORING SERVICES

Valencia College offers a variety of Learning Support Centers for currently enrolled students. The centers on each campus provide a multitude of support for many disciplines. Although the courses supported by the learning support department may vary on each campus, every center is equipped to provide assistance for the development of reading, writing and math skills. Many dual enrollment students are unaware of these services. However, all Valencia College students have the opportunity to utilize tutoring services, instructional software materials and other support materials. In addition, computer labs are available for use in completing Valencia College coursework.

Tutoring is offered inside the Learning Support Centers on each campus. Valencia College offers tutoring services at no charge to students for academic courses in which they are currently enrolled. You can also get tutoring online 24 hours a day, seven days a week through Smarthinking. Smarthinking is an online tutoring service free to all Valencia College students that you can access in the Courses tab in Atlas via the "Tutoring (Online)-Smarthinking" link. They offer live tutoring in math, science, writing, business, and computers and technology. There is even a new feature for assistance with job interviewing skills. Nursing and Allied Health help is offered on select evenings. Help is just a click away.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS (FAQS)

1. Can I satisfy all high school requirements at Valencia College?

No. The following requirements cannot be satisfied at Valencia College: physical education and geometry.

2. How can I access my Student Detail Schedule?

Log into your Atlas account. Click on the Courses tab, then click Registration on the right-hand side. You will then see Student Detail Schedule.

3. How can I verify what textbooks I need for the courses I registered to take?

Once you have finalized your schedule, visit the **Dual Enrollment Textbook** website for specific instructions on how to order required course materials.

4. What is the difference between dropping a class and withdrawing from a class?

You can remove classes from your Valencia College schedule without any penalties until the "Drop/Refund Deadline." Once courses begin, you are no longer eligible to register for it. If you decide to remove a course from your Valencia College schedule after the "Drop/Refund Deadline," it will be considered a withdrawal. After the "Withdrawal Deadline" you are no longer able to withdraw from Valencia College courses. Withdrawals remain on your college transcript and count against your withdraw allotment (1 withdrawal maximum) for dual enrollment participation; obtaining 2 withdrawals will result in dismissal from the dual enrollment program.

5. When does dual enrollment participation end?

Your dual enrollment participation will end when you have graduated high school.

Additionally, dual enrollment students cannot continue enrollment once Valencia College AA degree requirements are met.

6. Can my parent/legal guardian pay for extra courses/credits?

No. Payment cannot be received for increased coursework.

7. What is the cost for the dual enrollment program?

The dual enrollment tuition is free of cost for students. Your school and/or your school district will cover the cost of dual enrollment. You will see a balance on your Atlas account until the end of the current semester, but you are not responsible for paying for it.

8. If I become ineligible to participate in the dual enrollment program, can I attend Valencia College after graduating from high school?

Yes. If dismissed from the dual enrollment program, you may continue with Valencia College after graduating from high school. Be sure to complete and submit the following: FAFSA, Florida residency forms and final official high school transcript by the appropriate deadlines in order to register for courses as a degree-seeking student.
